

Since 1999, Sea Cadets have traveled worldwide for hands-on maritime training with international peers. More than 190 cadets have joined these exchanges learning new skills in countries like Bermuda, India, and Sweden. In 2024, 17 cadets and 8 volunteers trained in Canada, Japan, and South Korea.

GLOBAL CONNECTIONS IN ACTION

Sea Cadets don't just travel abroad, they also host cadets from Australia, Canada, and the Cayman Islands to the USA. These exchanges blend teamwork, adventure, and unique maritime experiences. Cadets train together, explore national landmarks, and gain skills they can't get at home.



Joe Purcell grew up in upstate New York. His philanthropic support and outreach efforts led to the establishment of the Commander William F. Bundy Division in Bridgeport. Having attended a drill recently, Joe felt the cadets "were so proud of their work and seemed to have found real purpose with their unit." Joe is an inspiration and an embodiment of how positive change can happen when people support our future leaders of character.





The year 2024 was an exceptional year for the Sea Cadets with a 4.5% increase in enrollment, new units in underserved areas, and expanded training opportunities in the maritime industry. We continue to develop young leaders through hands-on training, peer mentoring, and instilling core values of honor, respect, commitment, and service.

The Sea Cadets program significantly influences its participants, guiding them toward successful careers and leadership roles. Our graduates are well-prepared for various future paths: military service (14% in academies, 27% enlisted), ROTC scholarships (20%), higher education (26%), and the civilian workforce (13%). Over 55% engage with the military. The Sea Cadet program is critical to the future of our military.

Our Board of Directors oversees and supports the Sea Cadets organization, ensuring our financial strength and acting as ambassadors. Our aim for 2025 is to educate more cadets about career options and raise national awareness of our impact on youth. Working with these exceptional individuals is a joy as we guide young men and women to become tomorrow's leaders. We appreciate your continued support of our mission.
